## Helpful "How-To" Handbook for Leaders

First of all, if you are a new Den Leader, we would like to give you a big “Welcome!” and an even bigger “Thank YOU!” for taking on the responsibility and enriching job as Den Leader to your scout and to your Den. You may be feeling a little overwhelmed at all you need to do as Leader to help your Den achieve all the requirements necessary for them to earn their specific rank patch – especially if you have taken a look at the Scout’s handbook. We were in your shoes, and that is why we took on the project of making up this handbook. It

is our hope that this handbook will be able to help you do the achievements in a more specific way than the Scout’s handbook states. While the Scout’s handbook is easy to understand, it is still rather vague and general, whereas this handbook will be more specific to Pack 150. In example, the Scout’s handbook may say to visit a museum, this handbook will address which specific museums are willing to accommodate a den (or even the whole Pack) to visit, either low cost or free.

Cub Pack 150 has scouts from different economic, educational and developmental backgrounds. While you as the Leader may not have financial difficulties, it is important to remember that not all of your scouts and their families can afford the same as you. You need to not exclude any scout just because they can’t afford it, nor do you need to “pick up the tab”...you may just need to figure out a more cost-effective way to do the activity that will make everyone happy, and to avoid embarrassment.

Also, you need to keep in mind your scout’s other backgrounds. Some scouts have not had the same opportunities as your own scout has had in learning – be it educationally or socially. Some scouts are very mature or can grasp new concepts easily, whereas others may need a little extra help. The best advice is to remember what age group you are dealing with, and use words that they should understand, without talking down to them. Another big help: USE THE OTHER DEN LEADER’S HELP/ADVICE WHENEVER POSSIBLE! The “more experienced” Leaders may be able to offer an insight or other tidbit of information that we have not included in this handbook, (but we are hoping that they will add it to this handbook!). Some of the activities may be able to be done by other dens, so when you and another Leader(s) can combine dens it can make the activity even more fun for the scout.

And we at Pack 150 have always tried to emphasize having fun! – not just the scout, but for you and the parents as well.

Now, with all that being said, let’s take a look at all the dens and our (hopefully) helpful hints for you!  
(Please feel free to read it all, and not just the advice for your specific den!)

# Bobcat

*\*\*\*Please note: changes have been made for Tigers in regards to earning the Bobcat patch. In the past, Tigers did not work on the Bobcat rank until after reaching Tiger. In 2006, BSA decided that ALL scouts should have the Bobcat patch PRIOR to pursuing their specific den rank.*

How to help your scouts achieve the Bobcat patch by the November Awards Ceremony:

**The Tiger Den:** This will be the focus of your weekly den meetings until most or all of your scouts have met the requirements for Bobcat. Ask parents to also be working with their scout at home, too. You may want to plan on having some of the meeting time to be a fun activity, so the scout doesn't become bored. We don't want the scout to think that Cub Scouts is not any fun.

**The Wolf Den:** Plan on having one or two meetings to help any new scouts to your den achieve this patch. Emphasis should be made to have parents help their scout at home.

**The Bear & Webelos Dens:** You could have a joint meeting with the Tiger and/or Wolf Dens to help any new scouts that joined your den. This will help your new scout, plus give the rest of your den the satisfaction of doing a good deed.

## Tip:

For all dens **except** Tiger: have scouts who have already been awarded Bobcat, assist new scouts in learning the Promise and the Law. This can be done 1 on 1, groups working on the Promise and another group working on the Law.

**For all Dens:** The focus on your den meetings as you help your scouts meet Bobcat rank is learning the Cub Scout Promise and the Law of the Pack. You will also be signing off any scouts that can say them to you during the meeting.

**For all dens:** A den leader found that playing a version of "Mother May I?" worked. For example, new scout asks "May I take 2 tiger (tiny) steps?" Den Leader replies, "Yes, if you can recite the first line of the Promise." You make the difficulty of the request by the scout equal the amount of line(s) to be given. So if they wish to take giant ("bear") steps, then you may have them recite 2 or 3 lines of Promise or Law.

# The Tiger Den

There are 5 Achievements that the scout must do to receive the Tiger patch. Each achievement is broken down into three parts: a Family activity, a Den activity, and a "Go See It" activity. Since we know that you are probably new to scouting as Leader, we have decided to help you out by giving you a step-by-step guide for each achievement. You can plan on doing all of the achievements by using this handbook, or just use some...the choice is yours!

*\*\*Achievements can be done in any order...you do not need to do Achievement 1 first, followed by Achievement 2, and so on.*

*\*\*For the Family Activities, you may want to plan on that being "homework"...tell the scout that in the next week, he is to do whichever Family Activity Achievement number you are working on with your den at home, and tell about it at the next den meeting.*

## Achievement 1 "Making My Family Special" Den Activity: Make a Family Scrapbook

- You can easily have them make a scrapbook using folders that cost about 10 - 25 cents each at Staples or OfficeMax. You can also get a cheap pack of computer paper for about \$5. Have them draw pictures, as well as have them bring a picture or two to glue on the page.

**Go See It:** Go to a Library, historical society, museum, old farm, or historical building or visit an older person in your community. Discover how family life was the same and how it was different many years ago.

## Achievement 2 "Where I Live" Den Activity: Practice the Pledge of Allegiance with your den, and participate in a den or pack flag ceremony.

-Talk with the Cubmaster about letting your den lead the flag ceremony at the Awards Ceremony in November, or even at the beginning of a regular Pack meeting.

**Go See It:** Visit a police station or fire station.

## Achievement 3 "Keeping Myself Healthy and Safe" Den Activity :Make a Food Guide Pyramid.

There are books on this available at the church. See the Cubmaster or Assistant to use these. These books were already in the Pack's possession and we don't know where or how to get more. Please respect them and don't write in them so they can be re-used! Thank you!

Of course, you can always print one out online that could be written on.

**Go See It:** Learn the rules of a game or sport. Then, go watch an amateur or professional game or sporting event.

Check local schedules for Donegal sporting events. These schedules come home with your scouts from school, or you can just stop at any school for your own copy.

**Achievement 4 “How I Tell It” Den Activity:** Play “Tell It Like It Isn’t”. (Or “Pass It On” as you may know it as).

**Go See It:** Visit a Tv Station, Radio Station or newspaper office. Find out how people there communicate with others.

The Rose in Mount Joy is very willing to have Scouts visit.

We have found in the past that WGAL 8 was willing to have scouts visit, if they were there on a weekday by 4:30, which is rather difficult to do during the school year. Please don't take our word for it though, they may change policies in the future.

**Achievement 5 “Let’s Go Outdoors” Den Activity:** With a crayon or colored pencil and a piece of paper, make a leaf rubbing.

Have your scouts bring some leaves from their own yard. Make sure leaf is not very brittle or dried out.

**Go See It:** Take a Hike with your Den.

This doesn't have to be a long hike. Take a walk around Marietta, or you can plan to meet on a Saturday and walk some of the trails down by the River. These trails are accessible on any street off of Front Street in Marietta. The trails are reasonably well maintained, flat and with no motorized vehicles permitted.

- *You can also have the den make a walking stick. Broom handles can be bought at any hardware store.*

We are not going to break down every Elective listed in the book. We will just list those that were done as a den and/or really fun to do. Plan on having the scouts keep track at home of what Electives they do.

# The Wolf Den

**Achievement 1: Feats of Skill.** 1a - 1e **MUST** be done. And just 1 of 1f-1l.

This achievement is great to do outside in the first month or two of the year. You could have your den plan to meet at Marietta War Memorial Park. If need be, though, they can be done inside at the church.

A fun way to do these would be by playing Simon Says, or Mother May I? or Follow the Leader, or even by setting up an obstacle course.

**Achievement 2: Your Flag DO ALL.** You could easily do all these in one meeting.

2a is pretty self-explanatory.

2b you can talk with the Cubmaster about leading the Flag Ceremony at an Awards Ceremony, or at the beginning of a Pack meeting.

2c is pretty self-explanatory.

2d: Look up information online about the PA flag. See websites listed at the end of this handbook.

2e & 2f Possibly could go to the American Legion in Marietta and/or Maytown.

2g Should be able to borrow the flag that is used at the church.

**Achievement 3: Keep your body healthy. DO ALL.**

**Achievement 4: Know Your Home and Community. DO ALL.**

4a You may want to have the scouts make up their chart together. Have the phone numbers for Maytown & Marietta's Police & Fire with you so you can give them to the boys. For other numbers, such as relatives, neighbors, etc. you may want to have them list their names, but tell them to write those phone numbers in when they get home.

4e When they make up the chart of emergency numbers, you can have them write down 2 or 3 chores they may already have, or chores that they easily could do, such as sweeping the floor, keeping their room clean, etc. Have them promise to do these for the next month.

4f: You could try contacting an official with Marietta Borough. This can be done by attending a Borough Meeting and speaking with a council member about coming to talk with your den. We have found that Mayor Overlander was willing to come speak with a den, and we ended up turning it into having him speak with the whole Pack!

**Achievement 5: Tools for fixing and building. DO ALL.**

You may be able to talk with the other den leaders or parents about getting a hold of some scrap wood, if you don't have any. Same for extra hammers and some nails. You may want to look into kits that can be bought at Toys "R" Us to make a birdhouse....although this would mean asking parents for some money to buy them.

Another option is if someone in the Pack has wood that they would be willing to donate is have the boys make a toolbox. You may be able to do this achievement in one meeting.

**Achievement 6: Start a collection. DO ALL.**

We have had a previous den leader have their scouts bring in a collection they already have.

**Achievement 7: Your Living World. DO ALL.**

**Achievement 8: Cooking and Eating. DO ALL.**

8a: The Food Pyramid. There are books on this available at the church. See the Cubmaster or Assistant to use these. These books were already in the Pack's possession and we don't know where or how to get more. Please respect them and don't write in them so they can be re-used! Thank you!

8b - 8e: You could plan on having the scouts do this over Christmas break at home.

**Achievement 9: Be safe at home and on the street. DO ALL.**

9a - 9c: You could have your scouts this at home.

9d: Discuss the rules of street and road safety.

9e: You could have your boys go on a bike ride together.

**Achievement 10: Family Fun. 10a MUST be done, and any TWO of 10b - 10g.**

**Achievement 11: Duty to God. DO ALL.**

This Achievement should be done at home, and should NOT be done at a den meeting. Pack 150 respects the parents viewpoints on God and religion, and realize that there is no wrong/right way of worship.

**Achievement 12: Making Choices. 12a MUST be done, and any FOUR of 12b - 12k.**

We are not going to break down every Elective listed in the book. We will just list those that were done as a den and/or really fun to do. Plan on having the scouts keep track at home of what Electives they do.

# The Bear Den

This is where things may seem a little confusing. We will try to break down the Achievements and how to do them in as easy a way as we can. In the Wolf year, you may already know that all 12 Achievements have to be done. In Bears, however, you still have 12 Achievements to do, but now you get to have a choice in which Achievements your scouts do within four different groups. The four groups are: God, Country, Family and Self.

**God** group, the scout has to do one of two possible choices. This Achievement should be done at home, and should NOT be done at a den meeting. Pack 150 respects the parents viewpoints on God and religion, and realize that there is no wrong/right way of worship.

## Country

Only 3 of the Achievements listed must be done. We have listed them all with some suggestions of how to do them. They are:

-Achievement 3. **What Makes America Special:** Requirement a and j **MUST** be done plus 2 others of your choosing.

-Achievement 4. **Tall Tales:** All 3 requirements **MUST** be done.

-Achievement 5. **Sharing your world with Wildlife** There are 5 requirements listed, four of them **MUST** be done.

-Achievement 6. **Take care of your Planet** There are 7 requirements listed, three of them **MUST** be done.

-Achievement 7. **Law enforcement is a Big Job** All 6 requirements **MUST** be done. You can get an inkpad at a craft store pretty low cost; ask around first though, to see if another leader may already have one.

**Family** Only 4 of the Achievements listed must be done. We have once again listed them all with some suggestions of how to do them. They are:

-Achievement 8. **The past is exciting and important**

-Achievement 9. **What's cooking?**

-Achievement 10. **Family Fun**

-Achievement 11. **Be Ready**

-Achievement 12. **Family outdoor Adventures** 12b Have your den walk the trails along the Susquehanna River.

-Achievement 13. **Saving well, Spending well**

**Self** Only 4 of the Achievements listed must be done. We have once again listed them all with some suggestions of how to do them. They are:

-Achievement 14. **Ride right**

-Achievement 15. **Games, games, games**

-Achievement 16. **Building muscles**

-**Achievement 17. Information, please 17b** There is a can of charade ideas done by a previous leader at the church. See the cubmaster or assistant to use these.

-**Achievement 18. Jot It Down**

-**Achievement 19. Shavings and Chips** This one we would like to encourage you as leader to do with your den. This is an excellent opportunity for your scouts to earn an extra patch/recognition other than just the beads or the rank patch. However, we would recommend that if you do decide to have your scouts do this, parent participation is a **MUST**, due to safety.

-**Achievement 20. Sawdust and Nails** A fun activity that you can do with your den, or talk with the other leaders to have it be a joint activity is building the cubmobile. This is also an elective (Elective #7).

-**Achievement 21. Build a model** A fun activity for the scouts to do is rocket building/launching. You can buy the kits at Cool Trains (website listed at the end of the handbook). Launching of the rockets can be done at Riverview Elementary School, however, you will need to contact the school secretary at either the elementary or Middle school to get the proper paperwork and clearances.

-**Achievement 22. Tying it all Up**

-**Achievement 23. Sports, sports, sports**

-**Achievement 24. Be a Leader**

We are not going to break down every Elective listed in the book. We will just list those that were done as a den and/or really fun to do. Plan on having the scouts keep track at home of what Electives they do.

Elective 7: Things that go - This was done as a combined den activity by two leaders and their dens. The boys did most of the work building it (with some assistance by the adults), and then they painted them. They then "raced" them at Faith Outreach Center Church located behind Sheetz in Marietta (where Anderson Ferry Rd. and Ore Mine Rd. come together). This was a really fun activity!

Elective 21 can be done by having your scouts in your den help with doing the popcorn Show & Sells.

# The Webelos Den

Okay, here's where you may be feeling the most overwhelmed. If you are already an "experienced" Leader, you may have had the opportunity to explore the Webelos handbook and you may be thinking that you had it pretty easy up to now, and may be looking at which parent you can, umm, err, pawn the Leadership position off on...right? (NO!! Of course you would never think that!) In the past, you had only 12 achievements at the most to do and now you have 20 and never mind the fact that the book is so thick and you have an extra year to get it all accomplished, and \*CHOKÉ\* !!!! Okay, pick yourself off the floor, count slowly to 10 and breathe normally. We will help guide you through all the achievements and give you some handy-dandy tips towards getting your scouts (and yourself!) through all of the requirements, with the main goal of having your scouts earning the Arrow of Light, and possibly, the Heavy Shoulder Award!

First of all, and this is important: In Webelos, it is more emphasized that the scout takes on more responsibilities than in the past. The parent is still needed to help guide the scout, but they aren't needed in the same way as in the past years. The scout can help you during the meetings, as well as they can also run parts of the meeting. You can also start assigning "homework" for them to do – this will be explained more later.

## Aquanaut

Out of all the activity pins, this one is the most difficult to do as a den. If any of your scouts need to learn how to swim, we strongly recommend the YMCA of Lancaster. They offer swimming lessons year-round at a reasonable fee.

## Traveler

An idea that a former den leader had was going to RRTA and getting a bus schedule for each boy and have them do a "homework assignment". They were each given bus schedule for the Marietta route and the Lititz route to "plan" a bus trip to Stauffers in Lititz from the square in Marietta. They had to plan to arrive in Lititz no later than 12:00, and they couldn't leave Lititz to go back to Marietta until after 2:00. They had to use the schedules given to them to determine what time to leave Marietta to go to Lititz, and what time to leave Lititz to come back to Marietta. They had to also take into consideration the cost for the bus, as well as costs using transfers and without, as well as traveling times. Another "assignment" was using a map to mark a route to Valley Forge from Marietta. They had to find two different routes (using two different colored markers) to get there. He has in the past worked very closely with the den leaders of this Pack to provide hobby-related projects to be used in a den activity at low-cost. These include rockets and rocket engines. He is also willing to do a hands-on activity/demonstration of model making also at low cost, and would have members from a model making club available to assist the scouts at a den or pack meeting.
